## MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Reflecting on the past year I keep coming back to the importance of our connections to each other, missing each other, and rejoicing in seeing each other in person again.

Fiscal year 2022 challenged us—and our community—in ways that we would have preferred to have consigned to the rearview mirror. Despite—or maybe even because of—the pandemic's ongoing challenges, we've learned just how resilient our staff and our community can be.

You may notice the front of this year's Annual Report says "Celebrating Resiliency." People say children are the most resilient, but I would argue our seniors are because
